Music: Specialist Guitar: Year Overview Planning

Group Organisation and Number of Lessons in Each Programme:

- 3 children per group per 20 minutes
- For a full term: Average of 12 sessions per term (based on the Service Level Agreement with the School)

National Curriculum Objectives covered:

Key Stage 2: Pupils should be taught to sing and play musically with increasing confidence and control. They should develop an understanding of musical composition, organising and manipulating ideas within musical structures and reproducing sounds from aural memory.

Pupils should be taught to:

- Play and perform in solo and ensemble contexts, using their voices and playing musical instruments with increasing accuracy, fluency, control and expression
- Improvise and compose music for a range of purposes using the inter-related dimensions of music
- Listen with attention to detail and recall sounds with increasing aural memory
- Use and understand staff and other musical notations
- Appreciate and understand a wide range of high-quality live and recorded music drawn from different traditions and from great composers and musicians/ develop an understanding of the history of music

Children's knowledge and understanding during the course of and after completing the programme:

Understanding

- Understanding the definition of the vocabulary above and understand the context of where it is used.
- To understand how to read basic TAB notation
- Understanding the mechanics of the guitar and knowledge the string names and location of frets on the instrument.
- What the concept of an octave is.
- Understanding what a bar is
- Understanding the tempo of the music and defining if it is slow/fast, also being able to clap the pulse.
- Having knowledge of different genres of music and common artists/composers from the style while learning repertoire.

Children's skill development during the course of and after completing the programme:

Technical Elements

- Using correct posture of hands and fingers when playing the guitar
- Using the correct fingerings when playing melodies/chords
- How to sit down with the correct posture to play the guitar
- Holding the guitar at the right angle and placing it in the right place.
- Understanding how to control the volume and tone of the guitar
- How to pick up the guitar safely and to procedure of plugging it into an amp.
- Knowing what causes buzzing of notes and how we can remove the sound by pushing harder on fretboard or removing fingers that block strings from vibrating clearly

Musicality

- To be able to identify the difference of major/minor chords by ear.
- To be able to improvise melodically over a teacher's groove/drum backing track using open strings/fretted notes
- To be able to perform a melody taking the leading role in an ensemble
- Being able to increase skills in awareness of rhythm/pitch/quality of tone accuracy, applying this to improving a performance of a song.
- To be able to accompany a soloist playing a melody using bass notes or simple chords
- To be able to perform a set of rhythms from a call and response setting.
- Performing with and without accompaniment with good rhythm and synchronisation
